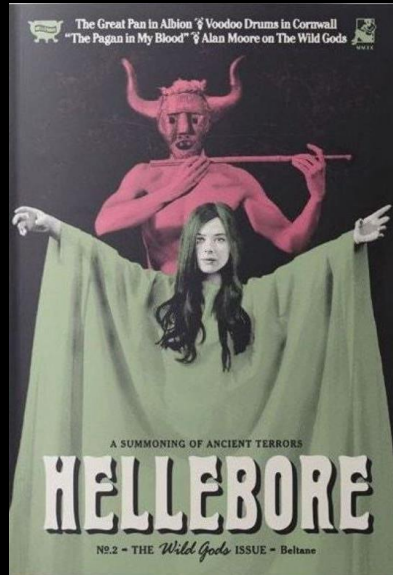
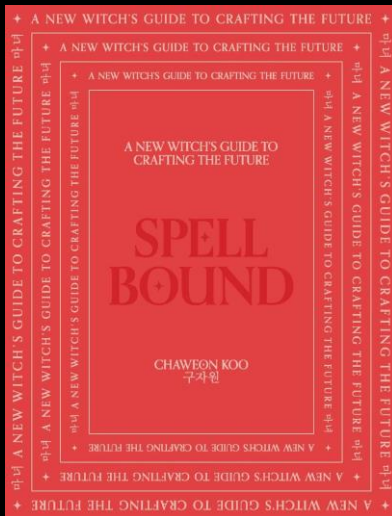
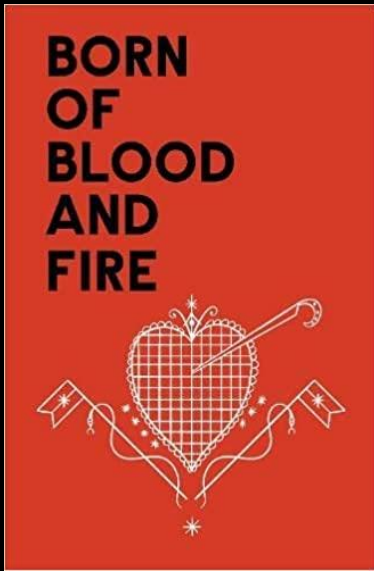
Early Printed Books

- 18th century works on popular magic and astrology



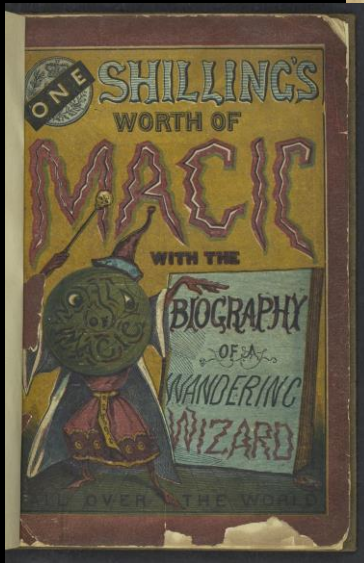
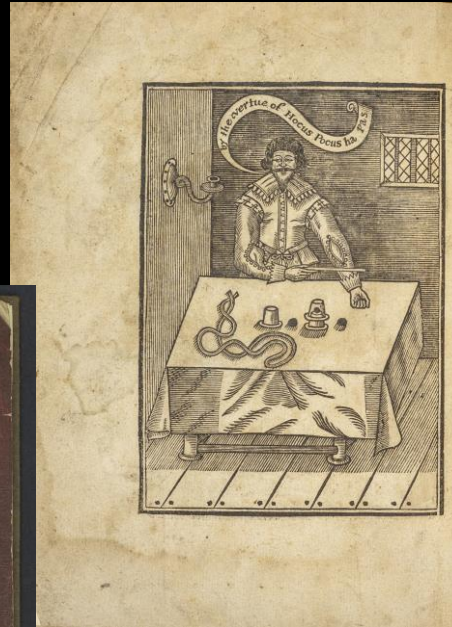
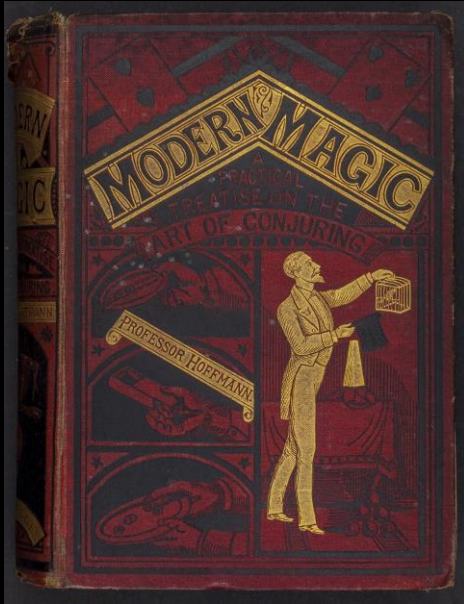
Modern Magic

A beautiful twenty-one-year girl, Miss Gordon, the daughter of a Scotswoman, has been chosen, the *Daily Sketch* is able to reveal, to play the chief part in one of the most remarkable experiments in the most remarkable experiments in the "black magic" ever carried out. The test will be made on the top of the Brocken, highest of the famous Harz range of mountains in Germany. A "black magic" formula, given in what is known as the High German Black Book, will be followed to discover what, if anything, will happen to a goat which should, if the magic works, be turned into a beautiful prince!

"PURE IN HEART" Thousands Expected to Watch Weird Ceremony

In order thoroughly to carry out the formula, which dates from 1500 A.D., the presence of a maiden "pure in heart" is necessary. Miss Gordon has been selected, and with thousands of spectators she will make the ascent of the Brocken on Friday of next week. Miss Gordon, who lives in the Harz country, is the daughter of a German doctor who married a Scotswoman. She uses her mother's maiden name. Thus, half a Scot, she speaks the English language as well as she speaks German.

"Personally, I think it's all rot, but the experiment is worth while if only to disprove the nonsense. Mr. Harry Price (director) told the National Psychological Research Laboratory in regard to a proposal to test a black magic claim.

A document before the society promised that it a maiden pure in heart and clad in white garments, a he-goat with a concoction of bats' blood, scrapings of roots, soot, and honey, the goat would instantly be changed into a youth of surpassing beauty.

The meeting was held at full moon on the highest peak of the Harz Mountains in Saxony. Those enquired what it was proposed to do with the beautiful youth got him. Others suggested that it would be better to take a goat in case they were needed. The meeting decided to leave members to attend a test on January 23.

EDITORIAL

ALTHOUGH, presumably, merely a stunt to secure publicity, the ostensible object of Mr. Harry Price, the Director of the National Laboratory for Psychical Research, in staging a reconstruction of the Brocken ceremony, is to "emphasize the absolute futility of black magic under twentieth-century conditions, and thus shame its remaining devotees". From the point of view of the occultist, the regrettable fact of the matter is that a distinct danger exists lest in the mind of the masses who read the Press reports, the vagaries of mediæval witchcraft may be regarded as synonymous with true occultism. Apart from anything else, the article by Dion Fortune, the first instalment of which appears in the pages of the present issue of this magazine, will sufficiently demonstrate how inconclusive must be any results achieved under such conditions as are likely to obtain on the occasion of the projected experiment, with the anticipated presence of "thousands of spectators" to witness the fun.

Students of occult and theosophical literature, however, are well aware that ceremonial magic, no matter of how "white" a

THAT GOAT

SIR OLIVER LODGE ON THE BLACK MAGIC TEST

Sir Oliver Lodge brought the recent abortive experiment with a goat and a "maid pure of heart" on the top of the Brocken, Germany, into his presidential address to the Society for Psychical Research yesterday.

"I am convinced," he said, "of telekenesis (the movement of objects otherwise than by ordinary touch) by direct observation. It may be the introduction to semi-physiological phenomena.

"There are experiments not worth performing, however, such as experiments with goats on the top of the Brocken, and many scientific men consider that attempts at telekenesis are in that category."

The Brocken Experiment

Mr. Harry Price has described his Brocken experiment as 'white magic'. It turned out so very white as to do harm to no one, but in intention it was jet black. He does not give the text of the incantation, but the adjuncts alone are enough to colour the operation. One considers the facts that: (1) The Blocksberg Tryst is taken from the High German Black Book; (2) the unguent contains the blood of bats and the scrapings from church bells; (3) the Brocken is notorious only for its association with 'black' ceremonies; (4) the moon is to be at the full; and (5) the essential he-goat is the classic symbol of the devil himself. And yet Mr. Price calmly states that 'no diablerie enters into it'.

The true object in this, as in many similar experiments, is, without doubt, a tryst with the devil in person. Satan is to be enabled by incantations and propitiations to relinquish his symbolic goat-shape and to assume human form. Had all gone well, Mr. Price and his friends would, no doubt, have found great favour in the Infernal Realm not only by presenting its ruler with a 'pure virgin', but by the less rare achievement of whitewashing black.
