So, what is an archive? What do you think of?

Archives are the records created by an organisation or individual in the course of transacting its business which are preserved as a record of that organisation or person.





Why would you want to use archives and in particular Lancashire Archives?

- The sheer thrill of using unique documents
- Local evidence to support or challenge national themes and theories







Lancashire Archives has 9 miles of shelving full of the raw material of history – a lot of it unexplored and unexploited





As well as 9 centuries of Lancashire's past – places and people; social and economic history



How do you access archives?

- TNA, BL and most local archives have online catalogues LANCAT.
- Always worth emailing in advance
- Always check the website before visiting for access details and double check
- Security ID visitors card; photo, ARA Card
- Handling pencils; laptops; photography; microform; gloves



How do you find what you want?

Ask questions

What are you trying to find out?
What sort of records might include that information?
Who might have created those records?

Use the archives as your starting point when looking for a local history research opportunity







Things to remember?

- Archives are no longer active records so when we use them we're often interrogating them for a completely different purpose and they won't always tell us what we want or hope to find.
- Potential difficulties handwriting and language, sometimes format and condition
