Indeed, the wider involvement of senior Institute staff in the mission of the University has been recognised in 2013, with the award of a Readership in Digital Humanities to Dr Jane Winters, and the appointment of Professor Matthew Davies as a Pro-Dean in the School. A flagship Institute in a national centre for humanities leadership, we look forward to 2014 and the return to our refurbished headquarters.

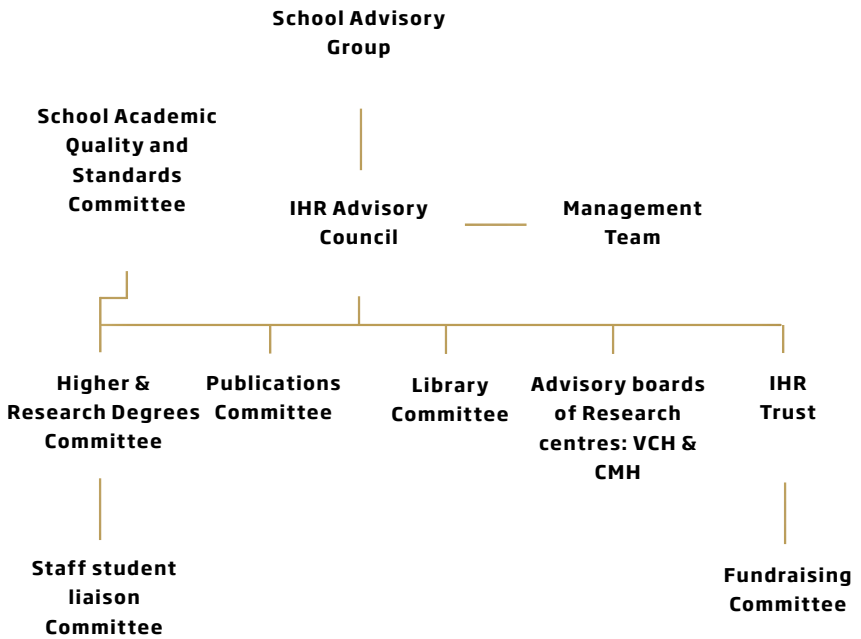
Promote the study of history and an appreciation of the importance of the past among academics and the general public, in the UK and internationally, and to provide institutional support and individual leadership for this broad historical community;

Students

The Institute has 24 students registered for PhDs at various stages of their research. Four of them are AHRC-funded collaborative doctoral awardees. The Institute is co-supervising these students with the History of Parliament and the British Postal Museum. The Institute's masters in Historical Research continues to run well. The Institute is planning to increase its student numbers by establishing an MRes route and a new MA in Garden and Landscape History course to launch in 2014-15. Much of 2012-13 has been taken up with the planning for this.

During the year, one student completed their PhD in *The Politics of Space in Chancery Lane 1760-1815* (Frances Boorman, supervised by Professor Miles Taylor).

Fellows

Over many years the IHR has been an international centre of excellence for the study of history and for the training of future historians. Every year the IHR hosts some 30 junior research fellows, dispenses bursaries to help with research trips, conference attendance and the costs of publication, and awards a number of specific prizes. Additionally, we are able to help research students who may be facing temporary strain on their financial resources. The IHR has two categories of fellowship: senior fellowships and junior research fellowships. Dr Jack Lord (Past & Present Fellow) has been awarded a three-year Junior Research Fellowship at Wolfson College, Oxford. Dr Nikolas Funke, also a 2012-13 Past & Present Fellow, now teaches at the University of St. Andrews. Dr John McTague (Jacobite Studies Trust Fellow) has taken up a lectureship in Restoration and 18th-century Literature at the University of Bristol, while his co-Fellow, Dr Victoria Henshaw, is a Visiting Lecturer at the University of Birmingham.

Dr Lise Jaillant (Mellon Dissertation Fellow) successfully defended her thesis in 2013, and has taken up a lectureship in Twentieth-Century Literature in the School of English at Newcastle University.

The IHR is arguably one of the best institutes in the world at which to conduct historical research. Not only is its premier open-shelf collection an essential resource for any serious piece of historical research, but the quality and range of its seminar series make it an unparalleled nexus for researchers to meet and discuss ideas. The award of a Scouloudi fellowship gave me the opportunity to develop and complete my doctoral research in this unique environment, where I benefited greatly from contact with other fellows as well as IHR members and staff.'

Research training

During the year, the Institute ran the following courses:

Introductory Latin, Methods & Sources, Databases I and II, Internet, Oral History, Intermediate Latin, Methods & Sources, Visual Sources, Historical Theory and Further Latin.

We launched two fully online courses in January 2013. *InScribe: Palaeography Learning Materials* is the first, free, unit in a much larger SAS/IHR project to provide a comprehensive online palaeographical training course. Later units, some of which are under development and expected to launch in 2013-14, will be chargeable. *Building and Using Databases*, is the first IHR online course made available via History Spot. The Institute intends to take advantage of the recent boom in MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) and other online learning environments, and we will develop online provision further to offer certification.



The Institute ran the *Oral History Spring School* (in collaboration with the Oral History Society) and the *Local History Summer School* (in collaboration with the Victoria County History), as well as the short course in *Garden History*. All were fully subscribed.

Following successful applications for AHRC Collaborative Skills Development grants, we were involved in the running of a number of training workshops in conjunction, separately, with TNA (archival skills) and MOLA/University of Kent (material culture). These workshops were free to participants and also included some funding for travel. This proved to be an extremely attractive approach, and all were fully subscribed. They included: *Archival Research Skills; Medieval, Archival Research Skills; Early Modern, Archival Research Skills; Modern and Methodologies for Material Culture; Skills for Study*.



Highlights

Library

The Librarian Jennifer Higham left to take up a post at the Royal Astronomical Society in August 2012 and Kate Wilcox has been Acting Librarian in the interim.

Collections have grown by c. 1500 new titles in 2012-13. Some of these are listed below:

The minutes and papers of the Westminster Assembly 1643-1652, edited by Chan Van Dixhoorn.

Werner Bests korrespondance med Auswärtiges Amt og andre tyske akter vedroerende besaettelsen af Danmark 1942-1945, edited by John T. Lauridsen.

Ireland in the age of revolution, 1760-1805, edited by Harry Dickinson.

The use of closed access material has been monitored to feed into collection plans for the refurbished library space. The Friends have donated £474 this year for book restoration including rebinding/boxing those in need of repair, such as *Anstis' Register of the Order of the Garter*, *Cartulaires de l'abbaye de Molesme* and a volume of the *Journal of the House of Lords*, and the purchase of book supports.

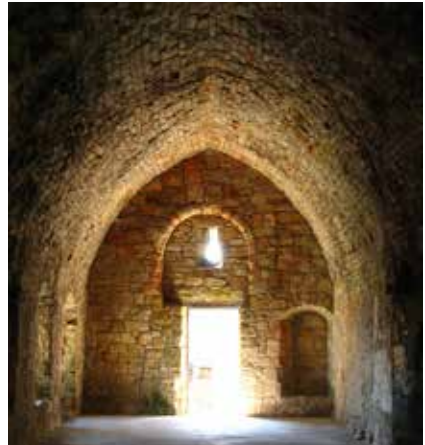
Victoria County History

The VCH launched a new series of parish and urban histories, which aims to bring local research to publication as swiftly as possible, and to inspire readers to get involved with VCH ventures in their own localities. The series grew out of *The Victoria County History 1899-2012: A Diamond Jubilee Celebration* experimental publication which was published in both print and digital formats.

In November we were delighted to present copies of the newly-dedicated volumes to HRH Princess Royal at Foundation Day.

The first of our new VCH Shorts series, *Mapledurwell*, was launched in March. A further volume launch in Staffordshire followed in May where Dr Tristram Hunt MP gave the first of the touring Fitch lectures to a packed audience.

The 16th England's Past for Everyone paperback was launched at the University of Greenwich in June. The year was rounded off by the second IHR Local History Summer School held at Senate House in July.

Publications

On 20 June 2013, British History Online (BHO: www.british-history.ac.uk) celebrated its tenth anniversary. Throughout 2013, to mark this achievement, a local history photography competition was run on Flickr. The winning images may be viewed on the BHO blog (<http://britishhistoryonline.blogspot.co.uk/>). The BHO digital library has also been enhanced by the inclusion of all volumes of the Royal Commission on Historical Monuments of England.

Eight new digital resources for British history were added to Connected Histories (<http://www.connectedhistories.org>), bringing the total to 22; more than 10,000 records were added to the Bibliography of British and Irish History; a new open access information resource was published (<http://openaccess.blogs.sas.ac.uk/>); and a free online palaeography tutorial, InScribe, was launched in January 2013 (<http://www.history.ac.uk/research-training/courses/online-palaeography>). Four workshops were held during the course of the year: two for the Analytical Access

to the Domain Dark Archive (AADD) project, one as part of the AHRC Social Media Knowledge Exchange (SMKE), and one to mark the end of the (Linking Parliamentary Records through Metadata) LIPARM project. The department was also involved in the two-day end-of-programme conference held in Cambridge for the SMKE.

On 1 March 2013 the IHR held its 'Finch Report, Open Access and the Historical Community' event co-hosted with the Royal Historical Society. It was well attended and well represented with views aired from the AHRC, publishers, learned societies, postgraduates and funders. Although the event did not resolve the difficult issues associated with open access for the humanities, there was value in bringing the history community together and progress was made in promoting the peculiarities and value of the humanities peer review system and the urgent need for Research Councils to clarify their policy.

Centre for Metropolitan History



The Centre held several very successful conferences during the year. In January, 'Going Underground' marked the 150th anniversary of the London Underground, culminating in a reception hosted by the London Transport Museum. In the summer, an array of speakers at a conference on 'Mobilising London's Housing Histories' attempted to bring historical insights to bear on London's current housing crisis, examining the varying degrees of success with which these problems were tackled in the past and the lessons they might provide.

Our collaboration with London's livery companies (Records of London's Livery Companies Online - ROLLCO) expanded during the year, with new partnerships established with the Salters', Tallow Chandlers', Founders' and Bowyers' Companies.

Development

In 2012-13 the British Friends of the IHR donated a total of £19,948 and the American Friends of the IHR donated £11,161. The British Friends hosted a series of events open to all, which not only raised funds annually for the Institute, but provided lovely occasions to meet others within the IHR community.

The IHR's Annual Fund contributed just under £20,000 and since its inception three years ago has contributed around £200,000, including Gift Aid and matched funding. The average gift to the Fund is around £75, with the majority of people - 52% - giving under £50 annually. The Fund continues to grow and proves that relatively modest gifts can make a real difference to the Institute. During the financial year a total of £492,818 was raised in support of the IHR's refurbishment and other projects. Notable gifts included: £50,000 pledged by the Foyle Foundation for a new 'rare books and folio collection reading room' within the refurbished space; £10,000 from The Basil Samuel Charitable Trust towards the establishment of the VCH Editor and Training Co-ordinator; and £5000 from The Normanby Charitable Trust towards the same position. In addition there are outstanding funds of £205,000 pledged for the refurbishment and £20,000 pledged in support of various seminars.

To date a total of £435,000 has been raised in cash and pledges for the refurbishment, although the total cost has increased to £605,000. To meet this new target the Development Office is launching two appeals - one offering the naming of library chairs, and the other to establish 'The IHR 100', which will act as a bridge between the refurbishment campaign and our next fundraising challenge - raising an endowment for the library, while looking forward to our centenary in 2021.

Over the course of the year, a number of IHR supporters hosted special dinners and events to assist with our fundraising goals - these included a special lecture given by Sir David Cannadine in conjunction with the London Library, and a historical banquet to mark the end of the Anglo-American conference on 'Food in History'. Looking ahead, we are planning more of these special events both in the UK and the US. The IHR is incredibly grateful to these generous individuals for their financial support and sharing their networks with us.

Networks

History Lab

History Lab is a national network of students studying history at postgraduate level. It is funded by the Institute and has been running since 2007-8. History Lab has continued to increase its membership this year, with over 1000 members. A new system has been initiated for 2013-14 which will allow the membership lists to be regularly updated and those who are no longer completing research can be removed and recommended to History Lab Plus.

During 12/13 the Institute supported over 70 networks involving almost 4,000 individuals and worked collaboratively with almost 20 individual organisations on various projects

History Lab has held four successful Methods Workshops, averaging about 20 attendees per workshop. The workshops held were: What I Wish I'd Known Then (10/10/12), Beyond the Card Index (9/11/12), Managing the Bibliography (14/01/13), Digital History (08/05/13). Next year, the number of workshops will be increased, including sessions on upgrades, writing, archives, teaching and study abroad. The format of 'Meet the Historians' events was changed this year with mixed success. Each event focused on a different area of historical study with experts from that field speaking. However, the narrow focus limited the number of attendees so broader themes will be introduced next year.

'The IHR supports, hosts and participates in a number of networks and collaborations. These 'are advantageous for advancing scholarship, strengthening the subject community, assisting with information exchange and aiding mutually beneficial collaborations.'

History Lab Plus

History Lab Plus is a national network of history postdoctoral researchers. It has been running since 2008-9 and is funded by the Institute. During 2012-13, additional financial support was given by the Royal Historical Society and the Higher Education Academy.

The focus of History Lab Plus this year was to increase our profile by organising more events across the UK and becoming more active on social media; establish at least two partnerships; develop new committee roles based on the needs of our constituency and to prioritise a membership strategy.

We have taken an active role in understanding the issues of Open Access publishing and the implications for early career and independent researchers. We circulated an online Open Access information survey and results will be reported shortly;

We have made further links with History Lab, History Lab Northwest and History Lab Northeast and plan to run joint events in future. We have two new partners/ society liaisons: Social History Society and the British Library and have continued links/ partnership with the Royal Historical Society & the Higher Education Academy. We have plans for 2013-14 to run joint sponsored event with these partners.

The IHR held almost 700 seminars this period, delivering almost 1400 hours of scholarship to 12,000 people.

People engage with the seminars remotely as well as face-to-face. The ability to live stream and podcast has widened our audience considerably.

History SPOT (including both podcasts and online training) had 31,730 different visitors over the course of 2012/13. A total of 10,751 unique page views occurred within the Podcast section of the site. The most visited seminar group was the British History in the Long 18th Century seminar, with 1,457 unique page-views; followed by the 2013 Gerald Aylmer Lecture (1,023) and Digital History seminar (859).
